

EaP CSF Georgian National Platform Appeal to the European Commission and EU Member States

The civil society of Georgia considers the process of visa liberalization with the European Union to be of the highest importance.

We are convinced that the country has made considerable progress in all areas of reforms envisaged by the Visa Liberalization Acton Plan. These legal and institutional reforms have strengthened the country's ability to control migration flows, and to ensure protection of personal data and the security of documents. Asylum and migration policy reforms provide conditions for respectful treatment of refugees, readmitted and the most vulnerable persons.

Creation of proper institutions and mechanisms by the State was an important step to prevent irregular migration. Introduction of modern infrastructure has improved the effectiveness of border management that has considerably restricted illegal crossing, trafficking and other cross-border criminal activity. Moreover, Georgia has progressed in terms of human rights protection that has to be further supported and assisted.

We are deeply convinced that granting the visa-free regime to Georgian citizens would create better possibilities for people-to-people contacts, and provide solid ground for culturalexchange, business links and connections. For a considerable number of Georgian citizens it would provide the opportunity and encouragement to explore and understand Europe without the Myths.

The visa-free regime will significantly promote the European aspirations among the Georgian citizens who would have a real feeling of being part of the European society. This will positively affect their civic responsibility and encourage them to contribute to the development of EU-

Georgia relations. In the longer term, this process will promote formation of a democratic society, based on European values.

Visa liberalization would be the best response to the external challenges the country is facing. The challenges, that could drive Georgia away from the Europeanization process and increase Euroscepticism among its citizens. This could be a well-evidenced counter argument for the Georgian citizens to address the critical approach towards the European integration.

Finally, we consider the visa-free regime, securing free movement of people between Georgia and the EU, to be a key factor in the successful implementation of the Association Agreement and the DCFTA.

We kindly request the European Commission to take all of the above mentioned arguments into account and call on the EU Member States to support the granting of the visa-free regime to Georgia.
